

New Rate Increase and Food Recycling Begins Jan. 1, 2024



Sustainability in Action

Effective January 1, 2024, you can now put food and soiled paper in your green cart and your material will be composted! **NO PLASTIC BAGS. ONLY BPI-CERTIFIED COMPOSTABLE BAGS (meets ASTM 6400 Standard).**

To cover the increased cost of compliance with SB 1383, a 19.89% rate increase is needed, effective January 1, 2024. Under SB 1383, residents are required to separate organics, including all food scraps, uncoated food-soiled paper and yard trimmings for composting.

IMPORTANT: Your residential invoices will also be switched to quarterly instead of bimonthly. So if you have your payment on autopay with your financial institution, please change the frequency from bimonthly to quarterly. For questions, please call customer service at 925-685-4711.

How to Recycle Food Waste

How do you get your food scraps to your green cart? It's easy. Use a small container for your food scraps. To keep it clean, you can line it with newspaper, a paper bag, or a BPI-Certified Compostable (the only type of Compostable plastic we can accept).

A food pail will be delivered to each residential customer the week of Jan. 22-26. You will be notified when they will be delivered.

Important: Compostable plastics such as cups and utensils do not break down completely in our compost process. These should go in your garbage cart.
