King County Commercial Organics Resource Program



The Organics Management Law (OML) passed in 2022 to help meet Washington's climate goals by reducing the greenhouse gases produced from organic materials breaking down in a landfill. As of January 2024, businesses generating at least eight cubic yards of organic material per week are required to divert organic material from the landfill. Other businesses will phase in as the minimum volume decreases in 2025 and 2026.

As part of King County's Re+ initiative, the Commercial Organics Resource (COR) program assists businesses in accessing opportunities to conserve resources, save money, and comply with the law. We are here to help!

What is organic material waste?

Organic waste is any waste from produce, meat, dairy, fish, grains, or similar materials from storage, preparation, serving, or selling of food. Yard waste such as small sticks, grass, plants, and leaves are also included.
